A SEASON OF GROWTH IN CAMBODIA

As we witness the growth of the Global Interaction cross-cultural team serving among the Khmer, we wait in excited anticipation for how God is going use this growing team for His glory.



Teams form the building blocks of Global Interaction's ministry and are key to the long-term sustainability of our work. Teams are formed by individuals, couples and families working together towards a common goal. They serve as branches of the True Vine, reaching out of their comfort zone, to share the Gospel of Jesus.

We believe that teams grow according to God's timing. In saying this, the Global Interaction family prayerfully petitions the Lord to place a calling on the hearts of individuals for cross-cultural mission. We also rely on local Pastors to identify, mentor and encourage their congregation with a heart and vision for the least-reached among whom we are called to serve.

Global Interaction began its work in Cambodia in response to an invitation to join an international Christian consortium engaged in the rehabilitation and rebuilding of the devastated country following the fall of Pol Pot in 1979. From this starting point, coupled with the deep desire to share Jesus with the Khmer people, grew the ministry that God has called us to today.

In 2013 The Centre for the Study of Global Christianity, which researches worldwide demographic trends in the Christian faith, published a report that identified Cambodia as having the ninth-fastest growing Christian community per capita in the world. As encouraging as this fact is, we understand that many Khmer believe they have to separate themselves from their culture in order to find Jesus as often the expression of Christianity is so foreign to them.

We believe, and our experience tells us, that for communities to be truly transformed by the Gospel, the expression of faith in Jesus must resonate within their own cultural understanding and experiences. Global Interaction's 'Pathway to Service', specifically trains cross-cultural workers for contextualised mission. During their first term in ministry (two – three years) our cross-cultural workers focus on learning the heart language of the community and immersing themselves in the local culture. This forms the foundation of the relationships they build and enables opportunities for deeper conversations and Jesus to be revealed in ways that make sense within the cultural context.


Praise God, the Cambodian team is growing! Ryan Smith, Global Interaction's VIC/TAS State Director has journeyed with Craig and Kim, who arrived in Cambodia in May. They are the first of four families anticipated to join the team in Cambodia this year. Ryan is also supporting Paul and Lydia who are in the final stages of their preparation for service. In Queensland, State Director Bob Rogers is journeying with Tristan and Megan who are also growing their partnership team.

Every team needs a leader and Luke, who served as Global Interaction State Director SA/NT from 2013, has recently resigned from this position and with his wife Rachel is preparing to serve among the Khmer. When in Cambodia, Luke will take on the role of Team Leader.

However, our impact is substantially larger with the extended prayer partners and supporters back here in Australia. For all who have sown into Global Interaction's work in Cambodia, thank you! ONE STEP AT A TIME

It takes time for the fruit of cross-cultural ministry to be seen, however each day, our teams are taking faithful steps towards the shared vision of vibrant faith communities.

We continue to pray for more workers, more branches of the True Vine, to partner with God in sharing the Good News with the least-reached. So we are asking you to keep your eyes open for more workers for the harvest. You might be sitting next to someone at church who God is calling to cross-cultural mission... You may recognise this in them before they see it in themselves.

The Flag

Global Interaction's vision is to see growing vibrant faith communities among least-reached people groups. This flag at the top of the mountain is extraordinary in its 'bigness'. There are followers of Jesus all over the world, but among least-reached people groups, there are very few. Among these communities, there are cultural, religious and spiritual barriers that work against people understanding and accepting the Gospel. Yes, the task is big, but it is the one we have been called to by an even bigger God and we believe it is possible.

Does this flag, or vision, resonate with you or someone you know?

The Mountain

To fulfil this vision, the foundation on which the flag stands is our mission of empowering communities to develop their own distinctive ways of following Jesus. This mountain is the foundation of our cross-cultural ministry. We believe vibrant faith communities will be established as the least-reached meet Jesus and develop ways to express their faith from within their language and culture.

Do you, or someone you know, have a faith-calling built on this foundation?

The Path

Core values form the path that Global Interaction cross-cultural workers journey with up the mountain and towards the flag. This path is where the 'bigness' of the task becomes a series of small, everyday moments building on each other towards the vision. It is far from a linear path. It's winding with steps sideways, backwards and forwards but ultimately always moving up the mountain.

While the path may look different for each cross-cultural worker, the steps they take are guided by the same core values of being attentive to where God is already at work, developing cultural competency, establishing authentic relationships and sharing the Gospel.

1 Attentiveness

A core starting point for Global Interaction's ministry is the belief that God is already there and actively at work. God has called us to these places, not to 'take' Him, but to partner with Him in the work He is already doing. This means that the first step in the path towards vibrant faith communities, is being attentive to where God is moving.

In Cambodia, a major obstacle for Khmer people to meet Jesus is that they do not feel they can find Him within their culture. They believe to follow Him would be a betrayal of their family as it would take them out of their culture.

Deb. cross-cultural worker in Cambodia, is attentive to where God is already at work among her Khmer friends and seeks ways to connect God's stories with aspects of their culture. Over time, she began to recognise the value Khmer people place on water and this prompted her to share about Jesus as the 'Living Water'.

2 Cultural Competence

Our cross-cultural teams are committed to life-long learning, but particularly in the first years of ministry, significant time is dedicated to culture and language learning. At a basic level, there is only so far a friendship can develop without a common language. More deeply though, the act of learning another person's language and seeking to understand their culture and what's important to them, works to break down barriers. The experience of making mistakes and initially struggling to communicate in even the simplest language is humbling and demonstrates to the local language nurturer the value that the cross-cultural worker places on the local language and culture.

In the Silk Road Area, there is an undercurrent of superiority of the R people. In response to this, the K people hold strongly to the identity of being K people and not R people. As the majority of R people are Orthodox Christian, it is culturally important for K people to separate themselves from this and identify as Muslim.

As the team on the Silk Road live and serve within this culture, they are intentional about being known as 'followers of Jesus' rather than the label of 'Christian' as they know this will be a cultural barrier for their K friends.

3 Authentic Relationships

Relationships are at the heart of Global Interaction's ministry. It is likely that a person in a least-reached people group will have no close friends or family who identify as a follower of Jesus. We believe, that it is in an environment of a mutual trust that people will be most open to exploring Jesus and questions of faith.

Particularly in the city, the Ethnic Thai are very suspicious of Christians and their perceived ulterior motives. Muana and Villy, cross-cultural workers in Thailand, recognise this and seek to demonstrate the genuine care and interest they have in their Ethnic Thai friends' lives, and only share stories from the Bible as the Spirit opens opportunities.

4 The Gospel

As authentic relationships develop, it is only natural that our cross-cultural workers share the Good News with their friends. It is an underlying belief of Global Interaction, that the Gospel starts at Genesis and encompasses God's whole story. The pinnacle of Jesus' death and resurrection is a core part of the Gospel, but it is not the whole.

As our cross-cultural teams live among communities, they share hope through being, doing and saying the Gospel. Through their being, they exude character traits that reflect Jesus' heart. In response to their friends' practical needs, they demonstrate Jesus' love by what they do and by what they say, they ground it all through sharing God's stories.

Please be praying with us, for our teams to be attentive to where God is already at work, be growing authentic friendships and be open to His leading as He uses them to build His Kingdom.

K people of the Silk Road Area

I attended my neighbour's birthday. She had prepared a celebratory 'bish barmak', noodles and meat served with tea with great chunks of floating cream... yes, I did enjoy the company! We talked about past prophets of this region whose power people still call on today for healing. The conversation prompted the friend to ask what religion I am. My neighbour quickly responded on my behalf, stating, "She follows Jesus." Woohoo I thought, there's a win!

The conversation went on and led to a discussion about Noah. Curiously, the friend knew the story and together we shared the story with my neighbour. This whole experience encouraged me and I am so inspired to continue in my language learning, to share more stories in the heart language of new friends... Connecting with people, in their heart language and learning to share culturally appropriate stories are the first steps to sharing Jesus.

H people of Central Asia

From Pete and Nomes

Over the past months, we've had a number of opportunities to spend time with the family of an H friend, Mr A, who we met at a local café not long after we arrived. His parents live with him and his family in their small apartment and they have a son who is only a few weeks younger than ours. Our work here is to share the love of Jesus, and we know that this takes time. As we build relationships and settle into this new place and culture, we are experiencing new things each day, but we are also offering new experiences to the friends we are making here. With this particular family, we have played tennis together, which was a first for some of them.

With every opportunity to share something new, to teach something new, we know that we are stepping closer to the time where God will open the opportunity to share Jesus, to teach from the Bible and to speak of a new life in Christ.

"In His own ministry, Jesus illustrated the essential principle of teamwork and being a team player. His small team of just twelve were a truly successful team that went forth to spread the message of the Gospel.

We must learn to become team players. Whether leaders or members of the team, each plays a significant role. Our cross-cultural teams, are invested in multiplying themselves; growing as a team, together witnessing the glory of His Kingdom."

Mama Shakila sits under a shelter made of bamboo. She has been there since sunrise and will stay until evening. She feels blessed to have a garden; the soil is fertile and close to the river. Her tomatoes are growing well. She has begun to sell the Chinese cabbage; the money coming in makes her heart swell. She is doing it, making her way in life. Mama Shakila has five children and wanting the best for them, she works to make it happen. Suddenly she jumps, waving her arms and shouting. Rocks flying and goats scattering everywhere, far enough away to miss the rocks but close enough to enjoy Mama Shakila's tomatoes.

She will battle goats the entire day. The hippos will come at night. Can she beat them? I do not know, but we sit together and pray. We pray over the field, for her kids, for her husband and for their future. Mama Shakila trusts God and she won't stop now. I will continue to love Mama Shakila, and help her to help herself. My charity is not needed, my friendship is. We learn from each other, journeying together in our faith and praying for other local women, waiting on God for His answers.

B people of South Asia

After many decades of hard work, in 2017 we celebrated the completion of the culturally understandable translation of the Bible for B People. Now, the translation is also available online. Whilst we do not fear owning a copy of the Bible in Australia, B People are potentially at risk if they are known to follow Jesus or be in possession of a Bible. For this reason, access to the newly developed website featuring the translation is important as people can read the Bible discreetly.

Team Leader Morris is continuing to work with several others to improve the site for easier accessibility and develop accompanying discipleship material. Work is also underway to develop an App which will ensure God's Word is even more accessible. We know God speaks through His Word and we prayerfully anticipate that the increased accessibility of the Bible will prompt many to seek and find Jesus.

Khmer of Cambodia

Having recently returned to Cambodia, I continue to be excited in reconnecting with friends. Catching up with Srey Mom and her family, I hear stories and see how they are growing together. Srey Mom's little boy, Seyha, who was not yet one when I returned to Australia, is now over two years old, trying to copy his older brother, and generally sporting a very cheeky grin.

My Khmer friends explore truth, justice and peace for their lives and for their country. Together we share rice, conversations and laughter. We talk about what it was like for me to be back in Australia, and what it is like for me to be here again. They share stories of the Khmer New Year they spent with their families, and a trip on a train, which was a first for their parents. I am so thankful that in the midst of all that has been in the past year and a bit, the roots of these relationships have held and that I am able to be a part of the lives of these women again.

For each of us on the field – waiting, hoping, praying for the moment when God opens the door for conversations about Him, or that may lead to a conversation about Him – is a day-by-day reality. Discerning the best response is important and sometimes containing our excitement is not so easy. So when one of our staff at the Education Foundation's office was recently inspired by the music she heard watching a Korean movie, and starting humming the tune well known to us, and less known to her, we knew it was one of those moments!

The song she was singing was Amazing Grace! Edwina had the joy of acknowledging the tune, and in doing so was asked to explain the meaning of the song. What followed was a light but thoughtful conversation, which led to a few questions more, which leads us to thank you for your continued prayer for our work here. It takes time, but we see that questions asked freely, will lead to a better understanding of, "knock and the door will be opened..." Amen.

Ethnic Thai of Thailand

From the team

We are encouraged as a team when local people share the impact God is having through our work here. We are blessed to journey with new believers, to witness to their baptism and celebrate their journey with Jesus. Mae Tong of the Ban Luang fellowship has been attending meetings with us for a number of years, however only recently chose to be baptised. Aside from the Ban Luang faith community, there are many others. All come together for a camp once a year, and take this opportunity to share their faith stories and to encourage and nurture one another.

Mr Krai, the husband of one of the faith community leaders has not always been accepting of his wife's decision to follow Jesus. At the camp however, he shared about a car accident he had a few years ago. In reflecting on that incident, he acknowledged God's hand in protecting him and his wife. He thanked God for our team members, Dema and Carolyn, who were there to support him and acknowledged the companionship of others in our faith community when the accident happened.

HEARING and READING THE WORD OF GOD.

Andrea Fleming, Partner Engagement and Communications Manager, uncovers the past, updates us on the present and looks to the future of the life-changing Bible translation project in Papua New Guinea.



Global Interaction's work began in Papua New Guinea (PNG) nearly seventy years ago. While we acknowledge the very real social challenges the local church is responding to, we celebrate that today more than 90% of people in PNG identify as Christian. The Australian Baptist community has contributed to this remarkable movement and today there are over 80,000 Baptist believers who regularly worship across the nation, mainly in the Western Highlands.

Fifty years ago, in 1968, Vision magazine recorded concerns, noting the ongoing prevalence of witchcraft and the spiritual bondage of the local people. Speaking of the impact on new believers, Global Interaction representative Rev. K M Shakespeare wrote, "... with the limited amount of truth that these Christians have, and the strong pressure brought to bear from the non-Christian members of their tribes, it is very difficult for these Christians to stand firm for Jesus Christ." He closed his article asking Australian Baptists to pray constantly for the Kyaka Enga people.

Quite likely, the result of our collective prayers sowed the seeds for the team in PNG to grow and for faith-based ministry to flourish. In the following decades, Australian Baptists in partnership with local people, worked to translate the Bible into the heart language of the Kyaka Enga people.

Knowing that the Living Word of God speaks to empower believers, we can only imagine what it meant for the local faith community, to not only be hearing the Good News, but to be reading it for themselves!

In subsequent years, copies of the original translation of the Bible were widely distributed but since then, many have been lost or water damaged. Recognising that there were very few copies left in circulation, with none available to buy, in 2015 Global Interaction partnered with The Baptist Union of PNG and promoted a Bible Translation Project. This project raised \$70,000 and began the updating and revision of the original shorter Bible. The updated translation is now in its final stages of completion.

One member of the Bible revision team is Pauline Longley. Pauline served God in Papua New Guinea from 1972 and then alongside her husband Andrew from 1985- 2001. Pauline and Andrew's heart for, and understanding of, the Kyaka Enga people contributed to the long legacy of Australian Baptist work in PNG. With Andrew passing in 2015, Pauline has continued their commitment, working with the team to revise the original translation into the contemporary language of the Kyaka Enga people.

The translation team includes; Susan Trapu and Henry Yalu from the Baptist Theological College, Traimya Kambipi a highly respected elder statesman of the Baptist church, former translator Kondopibngi Kupwa, Albert Kukiwa a Baptist Pastor from Mt Hagen and Heather Mapusiya, daughter of one of the original translators, who is a trained teacher and literacy facilitator.

Pauline, together with Sally Burton, former cross-cultural worker and field linguist, has recently returned from a time in PNG working with the team. She reported that 75% of the New Testament has been reviewed and significant progress has now been made on the Old Testament. When Sally and Pauline return in July they aim to work with Traimya, Albert and Heather to finalise the review.

On behalf of the Australian Baptist team members involved with the translation including Sally Burton and Geoff Cramb, Pauline is encouraging Australian Baptists to again dig deep and give generously to support the next phase of the project to raise \$15,000 for the printing and distribution of 2000 copies.

Pauline shares, "What a privilege it has been to work with such a committed and focused team, striving to make God's Word available to the Kyaka Enga speakers of the Western Highlands. As one member of the team shared when reading God's Word in their language, '... it speaks more clearly.'"

The team have commented on how relevant the teaching is today for the Enga church facing similar issues to the early church. God's Word is definitely relevant for 2018. Interest in the project is growing and as soon as the publication is ready for print and distribution people are expressing their desire to purchase a copy of the Bible, one that they can fully understand!

To hear the Word of God and to read the Word of God in your heart language is a different experience of the Truth. Together let's give thanks to God. We have seen God's spirit move in PNG, we have witnessed the development of faith communities, we have journeyed with and mentored local faith leaders and we as Australian Baptists have contributed to the Word of God being available in the heart language of the people.

This is Global Interaction's vision for all communities in which we work! It takes time, but it does and is happening. Amen.
